



Introduction

The 2024 Summer Newsletter highlights our commitment to advancing our services and supporting the community in difficult times. Here we provide updates on our work across the West Bank, in East Jerusalem and in Gaza Strip, key developments and future projects. Join us in learning more about our key achievements in the first six months of this year.



It is with great pride that we in this newsletter "Advancing Together" share the significant progress made by the Jerusalem Princess Basma Centre in many of its initiatives and activities aimed to support Palestinian children with disabilities. This progress has enabled us to expand our core programs, particularly in responding to urgent needs in the Gaza Strip. As we believe that everyday matters in the life of a child with disability, our multidisciplinary team in Jerusalem and Gaza



help overcome obstacles and barriers to offer their services to the children with disabilities and their families. We know that the need to our services in Gaza is huge to that we are aiming to expand our work there.

One of the main pillars of our work is the Outreach Program, which has now expanded to serve 13 additional Palestinian villages in the geographical area surrounding Jerusalem. In addition to the 14 community centers with which we have previously partnered, the program now provides assessment services and clinical support to local teams, in these villages.

Despite the current challenges and circumstances, our comprehensive rehabilitation services alongside the Mother and Family Empowerment Program continue to operate at full capacity, with 210 children enrolled in the comprehensive rehabilitation program Since the beginning of the year. Our team has worked diligently to overcome geographical barriers, contributing to the development of a Telemedicine Program. Through this program, the Center offers multidisciplinary online services to over 180 families in the West Bank who are unable to visit us in person.

We are committed to continuing these efforts, standing by our children and their families in all circumstances, to provide the best possible support and care, tackling the future with great optimism for smoother days ahead where every child can live in peace.

JPBC Response during turbulent times

A beacon in the darkness...

The Jerusalem Princess Basma Centre (JPBC) continues its important initiative in the Gaza Strip Heart to heart, from Jerusalem to Gaza

JPBC continues to provide rehabilitation services to children with disabilities in the Gaza Strip as part of its initiative "Heart to Heart, from Jerusalem to Gaza." As part of this initiative, a rehabilitation unit for the Basma Centre has been set up at Al-Ahli Hospital where 4 employees have been hired. Although the recent conflict has disrupted our work, we quickly resumed operations, keeping two important things in mind: preserving the safety of our staff and finding mechanisms that allow us to continue providing our services despite the challenges.

Despite the conflict, we have maintained continuous communication with our staff in the Gaza Strip while also launching a mobile treatment service for children with disabilities with an additional two of our therapists working in shelters to provide free psychosocial support and rehabilitation services.





We have found solutions to overcome the difficulties and obstacles of our Jerusalem team ensuring communication with our Gaza team. Through an online communication platform, we were able to study the cases presenting to our employees in Gaza Strip and observe their needs by preparing

questionnaires/surveys through which the largest amount of information was collected, which contributed to an accurate study of the situation and thus helped us to develop inspiring and effective plans.

To overcome the problems of difficult physical and virtual communication due to the lack of constant availability of internet services in the Gaza Strip, our multidisciplinary team in Jerusalem prepared a series of instructive clinical videos to ensure appropriate and quality services in the Gaza Strip.

On the other hand, the Gaza staff has focused their basic services on meeting urgent needs, and working with acute injuries such as amputations and fractures.

Our services were considered an essential part of emergency care, and although we were unable to open our rehabilitation unit at Al-Ahli Hospital as we had planned, until June, it is now working effectively, receiving many vulnerable children and

families every week. Because of the unstable situation, especially in northern Gaza, there were some temporary security closures.

"My motivation to continue working under these difficult circumstances is driven by love: Love for the work, love for the city and love in standing by the people and sharing their pain. Despite the challenges, my presence on the ground, representing the Jerusalem Princess Basma Centre, is a ray of hope for the children and their families."







"Sometimes we have had to reduce working hours to ensure the safety of our staff. Despite these difficult conditions, our presence on the field is crucial for the families, especially for the mothers who urgently need continuous medical care for themselves and their children. Being able to provide our services on the field, despite the challenges and difficulties fills me with pride both personally and professionally."

"Since the beginning of the conflict in Gaza, we have spent many hours on follow-up, especially with the support of our colleagues in Jerusalem, who communicate with us daily and provide us with professional and psychological support. Additionally, we hold weekly meetings to share experiences between the teams in Gaza and Jerusalem. One of the biggest challenges we face is the difficulty of transporting materials and equipment from Jerusalem to Gaza, which is why we are currently working with very limited resources."

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"The main challenges include the lack of resources and medical equipment, the difficult access to the displaced people in some areas due to the security situation and the psychological pressure on the children and their families, which affects their effectiveness in the therapy sessions. However, these difficult circumstances also motivate me to work even harder to achieve tangible improvements in the lives of the children. It is a humanitarian and ethical commitment



that reflects my dedication to my community and the children and gives me a sense of pride, challenge and determination to make a real difference in the lives of the displaced families and their children."

"For me, there is always a deep human connection between me and the therapists in Gaza, where we share cases and I offer them support. I strive to reassure them and their families in a deep and human way, creating a sense of belonging and bridging the distance, which in turn strengthens the professional relationship. In addition, I have made available all my practical and clinical expertise in this field. In weekly meetings, which last an hour or as needed, all matters are

discussed, especially at the beginning of the program when my collegues in Gaza need psychological support and encouragement."

Heart to Heart - From Jerusalem to Gaza

Psychological Support Services

Despite the complicated conditions, our team in Gaza is committed to providing the highest level of services with all available resources. To ensure the psychological stability of staff and volunteers, Musa, the social worker in our therapeutic Unit in Gaza, provided psychological support. At the time, the team was also providing therapeutic care for 40 individuals with disabilities, including children with disabilities, who had sought refuge in their displaced area. Musa expressed his pride, saying: "I was very proud of this work, which focused on meeting basic needs regardless of differences, especially in circumstances where people had lost their homes and places of residence."



Moreover, a workshop was held on working with children with trauma for those staff in our Princess Basma Rehabilitation Centre who are mentoring colleagues in Gaza. A consultant Psychologist led the training and we were delighted to have our small Princess Basma team in Gaza join online. In spite of the challenges in communication with intermittent Wi-Fi, both our Jerusalem and our Gazan staff learned and shared together, united as one team, taking strength from one another to face the challenges ahead.

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Adam's Journey: Overcoming Challenges and Embracing Possibilities

Adam recently completed his fourth admission at the JPBC; his journey began with a diagnosis at eight months old. A lack of oxygen during birth caused physical disability, because of which he was referred for rehabilitation and treatment. His family began visiting local clinics in their area, until they were introduced to the Basma Centre, during a visit to our partner in Nablus Farah Centre. At this time, Adam was three years and eight months old.

Adam's mother says: "When we received the diagnosis, my psychological condition worsened and I felt like I was broken, but thanks to the support of my children, my husband and the entire family, I was able to overcome this crisis and began the journey of treating my child, seeking the best services and facilities so that I could provide the best for my child. Our journey took us to the Basma Centre, where my child is currently being treated".

In Adam's first admission, his mother had simple dreams, such as being able to dress him easily as he had great difficulty moving his right hand, and she also wished that he could express himself, but his voice was very weak and he tried to express himself with sign language. His social skills were limited as he was very reserved and closed to himself and his mother.





However, at the Basma Centre, Adam received comprehensive rehabilitation services that enabled him to benefit from the different types of treatments offered at the Centre.

This helped his development, as Adam can now move his right hand. He uses it effectively during therapy sessions as he became social and enjoyed "playing with the therapists" as he put it. His communication skills have developed hugely; he listens well and interacts with adults and children.

Our professional staff are currently working to prepare Adam academically so that he can start school soon. His mother now dreams of Adam becoming independent and being able to rely on himself, especially for everyday tasks such as going to the toilet or putting on his shoes. As for himself, he tries to help his mother at home and with any household chores as he can, although he is aware of the challenges. On a social level, he is very active and now aged 6 years old, told us that he is happy about this interview, as he will become famous if many people read it.

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Measuring success and quality through the of our children

In an interview, we spoke with Lucy Gharyeb, the Clinical Services Coordinator at our Child Rehabilitation Centre, who has been working to rehabilitate Palestinian children with disabilities for more than two decades. Her journey, marked by significant milestones and inspiring success stories, reflects her unwavering commitment to improving the lives of children and their families in Jerusalem, Gaza Strip and the West Bank.

From Physiotherapy to Coordination: a Long-Term Commitment

Lucy began her journey into the field of rehabilitation at a young age, driven by a personal interest that led her to pursue a bachelor's degree in Physiotherapy. In 2002, she joined the team at the Princess Basma Centre, and continued working in this field until 2020, when she became the Coordinator of Clinical Services at the Child Rehabilitation Centre. In her current role, she ensures smooth communication between staff, patients and their families. Lucy emphasized that her work is not only about coordinating services, but also about empowering children and their families through active participation in the rehabilitation program - a mission she considers essential to her career.

Evolution of Services: A Commitment to Excellence

Lucy said, "When I reflect on the 22 years I have spent at the Centre, I remember the significant progress that has been made in the services offered, while maintaining a high level of quality. The Centre has always placed great emphasis on the continuous training of its staff to develop their skills and improve their expertise, in addition to ongoing renovations and the introduction of important tools and equipment. This has transformed the Centre into a National Resource Centre known for following best practices."



Lucy also highlighted the importance of the Mother and Family Empowerment Program, which was launched in 1997 as one of its most impactful programs, pointing out that it has redefined the role of families in the rehabilitation process. She also mentioned the Centre's efforts to expand partnerships with rehabilitation centers in the West Bank through the Outreach Program, which serves no less than 1,200 children annually.

A Memorable Success Story: The Power of Rehabilitation

Among the many success stories, Lucy has one in particular that sticks in her memory. She recalled working with a child who had lost a limb. The journey of helping him adapt to a new prosthetic limb and regain his independence was full of challenges, but the joy of seeing him walk again was a great reward. Lucy believes this experience has fueled her passion for her work and reminded her what a huge impact rehabilitation can have on a child's life.

Measuring Success: The Smiles of Children and Families

Lucy explained that the success of the Centre's programs is evident in the increasing number of patients and the expansion of services throughout the region. She pointed out that the continued involvement of mothers and fathers in the rehabilitation of their children and the tangible progress in children's development are key indicators of the effectiveness of our services. Lucy emphasized that the most important measure of success is the smiles on the children's faces and the new hope in their mothers' eyes.

Special Occasions

The Jerusalem Princess Basma Centre celebrates Mother's Day and World Autism Awareness Day 2024

As part of its efforts to promote community awareness and support, JPBC organized a celebration for Mother's Day and World Autism Awareness Day. On each of these days, the Centre organized a number of important interactive activities aimed at connecting children with their families and with other children benefiting from these activities to achieve therapeutic goals. The Centre believes in the importance of integration and participation for the children's progress, especially when the parents, particularly the mother, are part of the therapeutic process.

It is worth mentioning that the Centre organizes and benefits from celebrations every year on these very important days to raise awareness about autism and the needs of autistic children, in addition to strengthening the child's relationship with his mother, his family and his community.



Updates on Growth and Sustainability

Completion of the renovation of the inclusive playground at the Jerusalem Princess Basma Inclusive School

We are excited to announce the completion of our newly renovated inclusive playground. The playground has been designed to be a vibrant hub for the students, providing space for relaxation and sporting activities. This area has been designed to be safe and



accessible for all students, with a focus on fostering an inclusive environment that meets the needs of all.

The final phase of the project involves the installation of a new elevator, an important addition that will allow students with physical disabilities to better play and interact with their friends. This elevator will connect all four floors of the facility, contributing to the principle of inclusion and providing equal opportunities for all students to participate and enjoy their time at school.

Seventh grader Noursan expressed her excitement, saying, "The playground is now brighter, more spacious and safer. I'm really excited when we will all be together with our friends, regardless of ability. As it's covered, we can enjoy our breaks whatever the weather."

Graduation of Fifteenth Cohort

On Sunday, May 19, 2024, The Jerusalem Princess Basma Inclusive School celebrated the graduation of its fifteenth Cohort of high school students in a special ceremony in the presence of Rev. Wadie Al-Far, member of the Board of Directors of the JPBC and Pastor of the Arab Parish



of St. George's Cathedral in Jerusalem, and Mrs. Violette Mubarak, General Director of JPBC. Rev. Wadih offered his blessings to the graduates and wished them a bright future full of success and achievement.
